

A joint LC/PCC group has been working on LCRIs for both serials and integrating resources. For a few topics related to integrating resources, the PCC practice will not be determined until the BIBCO/CONSER meeting in early May.

Below, for each topic, you'll find the rule, background information, the draft LCRI giving the LC practice, and possible options for the PCC practice. Discuss each topic with colleagues in your library and be prepared to “cast your vote” at the May meeting. At that meeting, there will be only a very short discussion of each topic before the “vote” is taken.

TOPIC #1: Bibliographic relationships involving integrating resources: How will those relationships be expressed in bibliographic records?

Revised rule: [Note: Examples have not been included in revised rule below.]

12.7B8. Bibliographic history and relationships with other resources. Make notes on the bibliographic history and on important relationships between the resource being described and the immediately preceding, immediately succeeding, or simultaneously issued resources.

a) *Continuation.* If a resource continues a previously published resource, give the name of the preceding resource ...

If a resource is continued by a subsequently published resource, give the name of the succeeding resource ...

b) *Merger.* If a resource is the result of the merger of two or more other resources, give the name of the resources that were merged.

If a resource is merged with one or two more other resources to form a resource with a new title, give the name(s) of the resource(s) with which it has merged and the name of the new resource.

c) *Split.* If a resource is the result of the split of a previous resource into two or more resources, give the name of the resource that has been split ...

If a resource splits into two or more separate resources, give the names of the resources resulting from the split.

d) *Absorption.* If a resource absorbs another resource, give the name of the resource absorbed ...

If a resource is absorbed by another resource, give the name of the absorbing resource.

e) *Translation.* If a resource is a translation of a previously published resource (as opposed to a different language edition of a resource, for which see 12.2B1), give the name of the original.

If a resource is translated, give the name of the translation.

If the name of the other resource is not readily available, make a general note.

f) *Simultaneous edition.* If a resource is one of two or more editions differing in partial content and/or in language, give the name of the other edition(s).

If the name of the other edition is not readily available, make a general note.

If a resource is published in more editions than can be named conveniently, make a general note.

g) *Supplement.* If a resource is a supplement to another resource, give the name of the main resource.

If a resource has supplement(s) that are described separately, make notes identifying the supplement(s).

Make brief general notes on irregular, informal, numerous, or unimportant supplement that are not described separately.

LC/PCC practice for serials: The current and future practice is to give linking notes (reciprocal links) on all bibliographic records in the relationship. The notes are in the 76X-78X group of MARC 21 fields. With the exception of supplements, no related work added entries (rule 21.28B1) are given.

Additionally, when the relationship is between a serial and an integrating resource or between a serial and a monograph, LC serial catalogers will give linking notes on all bibliographic records in the relationship and will maintain any link to an integrating resource as its main entry/title proper changes.

LC practice for integrating resources: LC has decided that it will not give reciprocal linking notes on all bibliographic records representing relationships between integrating resources. Instead, a bibliographic history note (MARC 21 field 500) and, when appropriate, a related work added entry (rule 21.28B1) on the bibliographic record(s) for the later integrating resource(s).

Rationale for LC decision: Because there would be fewer occasions to give linking notes for integrating resources (description is revised rather than a successive record made) and because, generally, integrating resources will be cataloged by monograph catalogers, LC wants to keep the practice followed by catalogers for monographs: a bibliographic history note/related work added entry. LC also doesn't want to maintain the form of the linking note on the bibliographic record for the earlier integrating resource as the main entry/title proper of the later integrating resource changes over time. When a serial is involved in the relationship, it is important to have information about the bibliographic relationship in each bibliographic record.

Draft LCRI:

12.7B8. NOTE AREA. Bibliographic history and relationships with other resources. [New]

LC/PCC practice for serials: To show a relationship between two serials, between a serial and a monograph, or between a serial and an integrating resource, give linking notes on both bibliographic records.

LC practice for integrating resources: To show a relationship between two integrating resources if the main entry and/or titles proper are not the same, give a bibliographic history note and a related work added entry (21.28B) on the bibliographic record for the later integrating resource; do not add the note or added entry to the bibliographic record for the earlier integrating resource.

PCC practice for integrating resources: _____

Form of Linking Notes

In notes referring to another resource (i.e., linking notes), cite the entry under which the resource appears in the catalog against which the searching and cataloging is done. For legal works and translations that are entered under uniform title, construct the linking notes as follows:

main entry name heading/uniform title/title proper.

Do not include other title information or statements of responsibility in linking notes.
Exception: In cases in which the title proper consists solely of the name of a corporate body, conference, etc., and other title information has been supplied to explain the title (see 1.1E6), include the other title information in the link.

If the note cites a main entry heading, give the heading in AACR2 form. If the main entry heading on the catalog record for the related resource is not in AACR2 form, change it to the AACR2 form.

If the related resource is not represented in the catalog, cite in the note the entry that would be used were that resource cataloged under AACR2.

When specific information regarding a related work is unknown, give general information in a note.

TOPIC #2: For remote access resources, should previous “viewed on” information be retained in the record when more current information is added?

Revised rule: [Note: some wording for serials omitted]

12.7B23. Item described. If the description is not based on the first issue or part or on the first iteration, make a note.

a) *Serials.* ...

b) *Integrating resources.* Make a note of the latest iteration consulted in making the description.

Description based on: 1994 ed. through update 10

Description based on version consulted: Oct. 26, 2002

For *remote access resources*, always give the date on which the resource was viewed for description.

Description based on contents viewed on Oct. 21, 1999

Title from title bar (viewed on Jan. 13, 2000)

(Item described note combined with source of title proper note)

LC practice: LC has decided to replace existing “viewed on” information for remote access resources with current “viewed on” information when updating the record.

Rationale for LC practice: Because the “viewed on” information exists in the context of the bibliographic data elements recorded for the iteration, there is not any benefit to retaining earlier viewed-on date(s) for earlier iteration(s) in the “item described” note for a later iteration. When a cataloger has decided it is important to give a note about the earlier data element, the date from the previous “viewed on” information will be included in the note in order to give an indication of the time period (LCRI 12.7A2 will have instructions about giving this information in notes). LC decided that an instruction to replace the existing “viewed on” information with current “viewed on” information was unnecessary in the LCRI because the rule says that the information should be given when the resource is viewed for description; when data elements change, the resource will need to be viewed because the resource is being re-described.

Draft LCRI:

12.7B23. NOTE AREA. Item described.

Serials

The “Description based on” note may be combined with a “Source of title proper” note (12.7B3) but not with a “Latest issue consulted” note. Always give a “Latest issue consulted” note as a separate note.

LC/PCC practice: In the “Description based on” note, give the numeric and/or alphabetic and/or chronological designation information for the issue cited in the same order and with the appropriate prescribed punctuation as in the numbering area.

- a) could follow the rule;

TOPIC #3: Uniform titles for integrating resources: Should the policy for integrating resources be the same as the policy for serials or as the policy for monographs as stated in LCRI 25.5B?

Rule 25.5B has not been revised.

LC practice for integrating resources: LC has decided to apply the policy now in LCRI 25.5B for monographs also to integrating resources: (1) not breaking a conflict in the database unless the integrating resource is analyzed; and, (2) assigning a uniform title if needed for another manifestation of the integrating resource. Exception: LC will also assign a uniform title, consisting of title proper plus qualifier, when a bibliographic resource changes its form of issuance and doesn't change its title proper (e.g., not-analyzable serial becomes an integrating resource).

Rationale for LC decision/exception: One of the main purposes of qualifiers covered by rule/LCRI 25.5B is to create a unique main entry to separate serials with the same title proper so that the identification of links to/from earlier/later titles on the successive entry records is possible. However, the earlier/later titles of an integrating resource are on the same record. Assigning a uniform title when the resource changes its form of issuance but doesn't change its title proper will clarify that situation.

Draft of LCRI: [only one section given below; this LCRI is still a “work in progress” (also attempting to incorporate the section on “computer file monographs” in the section below and working on less confusing wording for subsections 1c, 2a, and 3a); the goal for this topic is to determine the PCC practice, not the exact wording of the LCRI]

25.5B. CONFLICT RESOLUTION

Monographs and Integrating Resources

LC practice:

1) *Single-volume monograph, multipart item not analyzed, and integrating resource not analyzed:*

a) If a single-volume monograph, a not-analyzed multipart item, or a not-analyzed integrating resource is entered under a title proper that is the same as the title proper main entry of another work, do not assign a uniform title to either work simply to distinguish them, even if there are multiple editions of either work.

b) If another manifestation of a single-volume monograph, a not-analyzed multipart item, or a not-analyzed integrating resource requires a uniform title (e.g., a translation, excerpts), assign a uniform title to the particular work as needed (cf. AACR2 25.5C for translations, AACR2 25.6B3 for excerpts, etc.). Use the uniform title in all entries for the work. Change existing records in which the work appears as a main or secondary entry.

c) If a single-volume monograph, a not-analyzed multipart item, or a not-analyzed integrating resource entered under a title proper is used in a subject or related work added entry and the title proper is the same as the title proper of another multipart item or of another integrating resource found in the catalog in a bibliographic record or in the heading of any series authority record (for series, multipart item, phrase, serial), construct a uniform title consisting of the title proper plus a parenthetical qualifier; follow the guidelines for adding a qualifier to a serial/series title (above).

2) *Analyzed multipart item or analyzed integrating resource entered under title.*

a) Construct a uniform title made up of the title proper plus a parenthetical qualifier for any multipart item or integrating resource entered under title if the title proper is identical to the title proper of another multipart item or of another integrating resource found in the catalog in a bibliographic record or in the heading of any series authority record (for series, multipart item, phrase, serial).

b) Follow the guidelines for adding a qualifier to a serial/series title (above).

3) *Analyzed multipart item or analyzed integrating resource entered under a name heading.*

a) Construct a uniform title made up of the title proper plus a parenthetical qualifier for any multipart item or integrating resource entered under a name heading to distinguish the bibliographic resource from another multipart item or another integrating resource with the same title proper entered under the same name heading in the catalog in a bibliographic record or in the heading of any series authority record (for series, multipart item, phrase, serial).

b) Follow the guidelines for adding a qualifier to a serial/series title (above).

TOPIC #4: “Item described” note for multipart items: Should a “Latest issue consulted”

note be given on the collected set bibliographic record for a multipart item included and then updated each time a later part is received?

New rule:

1.7B23. Item described. For serials, integrating resources, and multipart items, if the description is not based on the first issue, part, or iteration, identify the issue, part, or iteration used as the basis of the description (see also 12.7B23).

Description based on: Pt. 2, published 1998

Description based on: Vol. 1, no. 3 (Aug. 1999)

Latest issue consulted: 1999/10

For remote access resources, always give the date on which the resource was viewed for description.

LC practice for multipart items: LC has decided not to include a “latest issue consulted” note in its collected set bibliographic records because the holdings shown in angle brackets in the physical description area (with corresponding publication dates in the publication, distribution, etc., area) indicate all parts consulted.

Rationale for LC decision: Because it is LC practice always to base the description on the first part and not to change the description based on predominance as specified in rule 21.2B2 and 21.3A2, a “latest issue consulted” note has no meaning in an LC collected set bibliographic record. The information in angle brackets is distributed as part of the MARC record.

(LC will be issuing new LCRI for 21.2B2 and 21.3A2 to clarify that LC does not follow the parts of those rules about predominance. LC made that decision because AACR does not explain what to do with other data elements in the bibliographic record when updating the title proper and/or main entry. For example, if the title proper and the statement of responsibility both change on a later part, is only the title proper portion of the title proper and statement of responsibility area updated? The Joint Steering Committee for Revision of AACR will be considering how to add information to AACR2 about changes in multipart items over time.)

Draft LCRI:

1.7B23. NOTE AREA. Item described [New]

For serials and integrating resources, see LCRI 12.7B23.

For multipart items, include the publication date of the part in the note.

LC practice for multipart items: Do not add a “Latest part consulted” note when later parts are received; instead, update the publication date in the publication, distribution, etc., area and the number of parts in the physical description area (within angle brackets if appropriate) and the contents note if present. When the first part is received, remove the “Description based on” note and modify the description as needed.

PCC practice: _____

- a) could follow the LC practice;
- b) could give a “Latest issue consulted” note and update it when a later part is received.

TOPIC #5: Title proper for motion pictures/videorecordings: Will PCC libraries apply the second paragraph of rule 1.1B1 when cataloging motion pictures/videorecordings?

Related question: Does PCC want to retain LCRI 7.1B1 as a statement of PCC practice? [LC originally issued that LCRI on behalf of OLAC, not for its own catalogers who do not use AACR2 chapter 7.] If PCC doesn't want to retain LCRI 7.1B1, it will be cancelled.

Revised rule: [Note: Not all all of the revised rule is included below.]

1.1B1. Transcribe the title proper exactly as to wording, order, and spelling, but not necessarily as to punctuation and capitalization. Give accentuation and other diacritical marks that are present in the chief source of information (see also 1.0G). Capitalize

according to appendix A.

Do not transcribe words that serve as an introduction and are not intended to be part of the title. Give the title including these words in a note (see 1.7B4).

Sleeping Beauty

Note: Title appears on item as: Disney presents Sleeping Beauty

NASA quest

Note: Title appears on item as: Welcome to NASA quest

An alternative title ...

LC practice: LC will apply the second paragraph only when cataloging electronic resources and popular journals.

Rationale for LC decision: The provision in the second paragraph was based on an LCRI for chapter 7 (motion pictures and videorecordings). The practice in that LCRI was adopted by LC/CONSER for electronic serials. Because the provision could apply to more than serials, the JSC decided that it should be in 1.1B1 rather than in separate .1B1 rules in multiple chapters. However, there was concern at LC that the provision should not be applied to all materials because other rules imply that some introductory phrases are part of titles proper (e.g., “Here beginneth the tale of ...” in rule 25.3B). Because LC uses the cataloging manual *Archival Moving Image Materials* rather than AACR2 chapter 7 for its cataloging of moving image material, the LC practice does not apply to motion pictures and videorecordings.

Draft LCRI for 1.1B1: [Note: A suggested PCC practice was already included in this revised draft submitted to the LC/PCC LCRI group; not all of the LCRI is given below.]

1.1B1. TITLE PROPER AND STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY AREA. Title proper

LC practice: Apply the second paragraph only to electronic resources and popular journals. In determining if the words are serving as an introduction and aren't intended to be part of the title proper, look at other sources in the resource and consider the presentation, differences in typography, etc. If in doubt, give the longer form as the title proper and give a title added entry for the shorter form.

Possible PCC practice: Apply the second paragraph only to motion pictures, videorecordings, electronic resources, and popular journals. In determining if the words are

serving as an introduction and aren't intended to be part of the title proper, look at other sources in the resource and consider the presentation, differences in typography, etc. If in doubt, give the longer form as the title proper and give a title added entry for the shorter form.

Punctuation

1) AACR2 does not mention the problem that arises when data being transcribed for the bibliographic description include a colon, a slash, or the equals sign ...

Draft LCRI for 7.1B1:

7.1B1. TITLE AND STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY AREA. Title Proper.

Note: LC uses *Archival Moving Image Materials*, rather than *Anglo-American Cataloguing Rules*, for all its moving image materials cataloging.

PCC practice: When credits for performer, author, director, producer, “presenter,” etc., precede or follow the title in the chief source, in general do not consider them as part of the title proper, even though the language used integrates the credits with the title. (In the examples below, the italicized words are to be considered the title proper.)

Twentieth Century Fox presents *Star wars*
 Steve McQueen in *Bullitt*
 Ed Asner as *Lou Grant*
 Jerry Wald's production of *The story on page one*
Ordinary people, starring Mary Tyler Moore and Donald

This does not apply to the following cases:

1) the credit is *within* the title, rather than preceding it;

CBS special report
 IBM—close up
 IBM puppet shows

2) the credit is actually a fanciful statement aping a credit;

Little Roquefort in Good mousekeeping

3) the credit is represented by a possessive immediately preceding the remainder of the title.

Neil Simon's Seems like old times

Possibilities for PCC practice:

PCC libraries:

- a) could follow the suggested PCC practice given in draft LCRI 1.1B1 above: apply the provision to motion pictures, videorecordings, electronic resources, and popular journals;
- b) could expand the suggested PCC practice to materials covered by other chapters;
- c) could restrict the suggested PCC practice.

Decision on LCRI 7.1B1:

- a) reissue LCRI as a statement of PCC practice;
- b) cancel LCRI.

TOPIC # 6: Should the option in rule 1.4F8 be applied to supply a beginning and/or ending date when the first and/or last issue, iteration, or part is not available?

Revised rule:

1.4F8. Dates for serials, integrating resources, and multipart items. If the first published issue, iteration, or part is available, give the beginning date followed by a hyphen. If the resource has ceased or is complete and the last published issue, iteration, or part is available, give the ending date, preceded by a hyphen. If the first and last published issues, iterations, or parts are available, give the beginning and ending publication dates, separated by a hyphen. If the publication date is the same for all issues, iterations, or parts, give only that date as the single date. For an updating loose-leaf, supply the date of the last update if considered important.

[examples omitted]

If the first and/or last published issue, iteration, or part is not available, do not give the beginning and/or ending date; give information about the beginning and/or ending date in a note if it can be readily ascertained (see 1.7B9, 12.7B11.1).

[examples omitted]

Optionally, supply the beginning and/or ending publication date in the publication, distribution, etc., area if it can be readily ascertained.

[examples omitted]

LC practice: LC will not apply the option for serials, integrating resources, or multipart items.

Rationale for LC decision: This option decision is LC’s current practice except for updating electronic resources. Note that the LC practice for serials is also the current PCC practice for serials. The time, effort, and potential disagreement involved in trying to supply a beginning and/or ending date when the first and/or last issue, iteration, or part isn’t available doesn’t equal the benefit gained from having such a supplied date in the 260 \$c instead of in a note (362 1); LC’s Computer File Team knows how difficult it is to supply such a date. A serial record with such a supplied date would be internally illogical because there would not be corresponding data elements in the numbering area. The draft LCRI now includes LC’s practice for showing its holdings for incomplete multipart items.

Draft LCRI:

1.4F8. PUBLICATION, DISTRIBUTION, ETC., AREA. Dates for serials, integrating resources, and multipart items

Option Decision

LC practice: Do not give a beginning and/or ending date if the first and/or last published issue, iteration, or part is not available. LC catalogers: see below for information on temporary dates for multipart items.

Note: This option decision is a change in LC's practice for updating electronic resources. Until Sept. 1, 2002, a beginning date was supplied when the first iteration was not available; do not change any existing records.

PCC practice: _____

Qualifying Multiple Dates

If multiple dates need to be qualified (e.g., because they appear in non-Gregorian

years or the item shows copyright dates that differ from the publication dates), record the qualifying dates after the inclusive dates for the earliest and latest volumes.

Incomplete Multipart Items: Temporary Dates

LC practice:

Distinguish between permanent and temporary dates. Indicate that dates are temporary by enclosing them within angle brackets. Input three spaces following the last date within the brackets.

If an entire date is judged to be permanent, record it without angle brackets.

TOPIC #7: This topic relates to MARC 21 rather than to cataloging rules. However, it is important that there be a common understanding about the MARC field used for notes about title information other than the title proper no longer appearing on the current iteration of an integrating resource. Because the text for MARC 21 fields 247 and 547 hasn't been updated to reflect changes in AACR2 revised chapter 12, LC is including in an LCRI the revised wording sent to Network Development and MARC Standards Office to be published in the next update to MARC 21 Bibliographic Format.

Revised related rules:

12.7B4.1. Makes notes on titles other than the title proper borne by the resource, and changes to such titles, if considered to be important.

12.7B5.2. Change in parallel title

a) *Serials.* [wording for serials omitted]

Field Definition and Scope

This field contains a former title proper. This field is used when one cataloging record represents several titles proper associated with an entity. For instance, under some cataloging rules (e.g., ALA rules) a serial is cataloged under the latest title, with former titles proper noted in the same record. Under some cataloging rules (e.g., AACR) an integrating resource is cataloged under the latest title, with former titles proper noted in the same record. Former titles proper may also be recorded in field 547 (Former Title Proper Complexity Note).

Under some cataloging rules (e.g., AACR) separate bibliographic records are created when there has been a major change in the serial title proper. When such separate records are made, the linking entry fields 780 and 785 may be used to show the preceding and succeeding entries.

Field Definition and Scope

This field contains a note that expresses a complex relationship between titles proper whenever an intelligible note cannot be system generated from the data in field 247 (Former Title Proper).
