Yet having arrived in the brave new world of the digital and virtual, now is the time to inspect our founding principles and ideals. We must reexamine them in the light of current circumstances--tight budgets, greater accountability, emerging technologies, and new customer bases. How do we combine the best of what we have built with new insights and new tools? How do we build upon our solid foundation and add our changing roles and opportunities?



The 2012 FEDLINK Fall Exposition will create a common space, a drawing board, for federal colleagues to explore the latest developments all the while reflecting on the fundamentals of our profession and our services. A combination of presentations from noted experts will look

at issues from the hottest topics of "Big Data" to the traditional of access, reference, and collection management. Presenters and participants will examine federal libraries from the top of the cloud, through the stewardship of the collections, and back to grey literature, and all the combined resources essential to an information driven world.

Topics on Wednesday will feature plenary sessions on federal collaboration via the tradition of poetry followed by a special guest speaker on the importance of grey literature in the research of the Cold War. In the afternoon sessions, there will be a choice of topics including accessing grey literature in collections in the U.S. and abroad, an update on collaborative efforts on storing shared collections, developments in the Semantic Web and emerging library technologies.

Thursday's agenda begins with a general FEDLINK membership meeting that features topics on the business of federal

libraries and then a guest speaker who will spotlight what federal librarians really need to know about "Big Data." Afternoon breakout sessions will offer attendees a choice between the topics of potential revisions of the 1410 classification guidelines, the Google books case, digital stewardship, and emerging copyright issues.
