Freedom's Battlefield.

[Nothing can be more appropriate to the "Day We Celebrate" than the subjoined extract from the oration by George William Curtis, delivered at the one-hundredth anniversary of the battle of Concord.—ED.]

"Fellow citizens, that union is the lofty task which this hallowed day and this sacred hour impose upon us. And what cloud of doubt so dark hangs over us as that which lowered above the colonies when the troops of the king marched into the town, and the men of Middlesex resolved to pass the bridge? With their faith and their will we shall win their victory. No royal governor, indeed, sits in yon stately capital; no hostile fleet, for many a year, has vexed the waters of our coast; nor is any army but our own ever likely to tread our soil. Not such are our enemies to-day. They do not come proudly stepping to the drum beat, with bayonets flashing in the morning sun. But wherever party spirit shall strain the ancient guarantees of freedom, or bigotry and ignorance shall lay their fatal hands upon education, or the arrogance of caste shall strike at equal rights, or corruption shall poison the very springs of national life, there, minute men of liberty, are your Lexington Green and Concord Bridge; and as you love your country and your kind, and would have your children rise up and call you blessed, spare not the enemy. Over the hills, out of the earth, down from the clouds, pour in resistless might. Fire from every rock and tree, from door and window, from hearthstone and chamber; hang upon his flank and rear from noon to sunset, and so through a land blazing with holy indignation hurl the hordes of ignorance and corruption and injustice back, back in utter defeat and ruin!"
