


The District of Columbia Court of Appeals Library

serves D.C. Court of Appeals judges, clerks, and court staff. It is not open to the public. The library moved from its prior home in the Moultrie Courthouse in 2010, when the current courthouse building was completely renovated for the D.C. Court of Appeals. The tour will include a look at the resources and services offered by the library as well as a tour of the historic courthouse.

This building was originally designed in 1820 to serve as the first City Hall for the District of Columbia. On this site in 1868, residents of the District raised funds to commission the first public memorial for President Lincoln—a marble statue by sculptor Lot Flannery that still stands today.

Besides key trials of historic importance, prominent citizens have held offices in the D.C. Court of Appeals Courthouse building, including Frederick Douglass and President Theodore Roosevelt, when he served as Commissioner of the U.S. Civil Service.
